3rd Sunday of Lent - Fr. Leo

Exodus, our first reading, the people grumble against Moses. They feel stuck in a desert with no water. God responds by having Moses hit the rock to bring water to the Israelites. Though they showed a lack of faith, it was in their weakness that God brought life. Our Psalm encourages us to trust in God's goodness and not harden our hearts.

The woman at the well receives the "water of life" because Jesus loves her in her weakness. She is alone with Jesus at the well because of her "sinful" life. Avoiding ridicule, she comes at noon in the heat of the day, when no one else will be there to draw water. Divine providence brings the two together and the woman is invited by Jesus, to receive salvation. Despite her "sin" Jesus gives her dignity and restores her life. She becomes part of her community again by bringing the gift she had been given to them; life in Christ.

This story engenders hope as we know Jesus does not hold our sin against us. Jesus is always with us inviting us to draw freely from the well of his Spirit, that we may live in the freedom of his love. Like the woman at the well, Jesus knows us inside and out and doesn't judge us. He only calls us to live in his freedom by freely accepting his love into our hearts.

As we receive Eucharist today, we receive Christ. Let us allow God's love to flow over us and into the deepest recesses of our hearts. Let us allow this love to transform us and make us apostles of this same Love to all!
